Fall Council Meeting 2019 Submitted by Vickie Sierchio

PA Questers held the Fall Council Meeting at the William Penn Inn, with 100 members in attendance. President, Ken Keiser urged us to continue to recruit new members.

Sharon A. Holt, PhD presented "The Miracle Alliance: Civil War Reconstruction and Women's Suffrage." Dr. Holt is currently Assistant Teaching Professor of History and cofounder/coordinator, Public History minor at Penn State, Abington. In 2020, we celebrate the 150th anniversary of the 15th Amendment giving black men the right to vote, and the 100th Anniversary of the 19th Amendment, providing women the right to vote. Dr. Holt presented a lesser-known story of the interrelationship of the two amendments.

In 1936, James Henry Hammond, a slave owner of South Carolina, was also a member of the U.S. House of Representatives and presented a resolution to cease debate about ending slavery and compensating slave owners for their loss. At the same time, two sisters, Sarah and Angelina Grimke, came out of South Carolina to fight with the abolitionists having been exposed to Quaker beliefs in Philadelphia. They wrote about political matters in their own names and spoke across the US and internationally. Thus, abolition aligned with empowerment of women through their speech and publications. They worked with Frederick Douglas, Harriet Tubman, John Brown, Lucretia LaMott, and other abolitionists. This alliance of black, white, men and women fought to end slavery and raise the role of women beyond being chattel. It resulted in passage of the 15th amendment in 1870 giving black men the right to vote. Unfortunately, women suffrage was put on the sidelines. However, Douglas continued to fight for women suffrage until it was won.

Women fiercely opposed the advice to be patient and felt betrayed by the formerly multi-racial alliance. But fifty years later, after a political showdown during World War I, including imprisonment and torture of suffragists, the 19th Amendment won women the right to vote. Although there continued to be divisions among activists fighting against racism and sexism in the following years, Dr. Holt reminds us of this powerful coalition that once stood shoulder to shoulder and were mighty more than 150 years ago. She asked that we celebrate the anniversary year ahead telling that story.

To kick-off for our 40th anniversary PA State President **Ken Keiser** addressed the Dames of Rocksville and shared that Questers is in need of both publicity and younger members. We took this challenge seriously with several new younger members recently joining us.

Our December 3, 2019 meeting marking the end of our 40th year was very special as we remembered the late **Marie Kalberer**, a charter member of the Dames of Rocksville. With a bequest from Marie's estate, a display case was built and installed in the farmhouse at Playwicki Farm in Lower Southampton, PA, to show historical artifacts from several archaeology digs done there over the years. Among the artifacts on display are a workman's steel measuring tape, circa 1920, a sickle with a wooden handle, circa 1880, and a paperweight, circa 1890.

Marie was a generous supporter of the farm, and we know she would be pleased that we have used her bequest in this way. In addition to the Questers, some members of the Playwicki Farm Foundation were present as well as reporters from local newspapers. Several articles with photos were published. We are hopeful that they spark curiosity in readers interested in history and wanting to learn more about the Questers.

The Brittany Belles' January speaker was Doug Miller, Site Administrator of Pennsbury Manor in Bucks County, PA. His talk gave members many details of William Penn's life, which many of us learned for the first time.

William Penn was born in 1644 into a wealthy family. His father, Sir William Penn, was an admiral in the British Navy. Young William was educated at Chigwell, Essex and Oxford University. About 1680, Charles II gave William land in America as payment of a debt that England owed his deceased father. William had become a Quaker because of his religious principles while still in England, and when he came to America in 1682, it was to provide a refuge for Quakers. He founded the province of Pennsylvania in British North America, his vision being freedom of any religion in the new world, and his democratic principles inspired the United States Constitution.

Pennsbury Manor was built in 1683, and after years of disrepair was reconstructed in the early 20th century. William Penn lived there less than 10 years with his family and then returned to England and died there in 1718.



Round Meadow Run #126 Explores the Continental Tavern Submitted by Kathy Baker

In the fall of 2019, Round Meadow Run Questers were treated to an experience beyond their expectations, when they visited the Continental Tavern in Yardley. The tavern is popular today for its cuisine, but it was the tour and the story the old building has to tell that enthralled our chapter.

The pub dates to the mid 1800s and was known as the Continental Hotel at that time. In 2007, it was purchased by Frank Lyons who began restoration to its 1877 style. Frank had no idea of the history that would be revealed in the underground chamber beneath the main floor of the tavern. A tunnel was discovered leading deep into the ground. Historians believe this tunnel was connected to other tunnels leading from the canal and connected the tavern to two other Yardley way stations of the Underground Railroad. The excavation also revealed thousands of artifacts including beer and whiskey bottles, lightbulbs, clay pipes and more all of which are catalogued, dated and are stored in the third floor in addition to being displayed throughout the tavern.

Our group was treated to hear Frank Lyon's daughter Colleen as she recounted her multiple experiences with ghosts that inhabit the third floor, friendly ghosts of African Americans. On our tour Colleen explained the tavern's history and hers with it, mesmerizing her visitors, and our Questers left wondering about the stories yet to come.

Dark Valley #222 Visits Cairnwood Estate

Dark Valley Questers **Diana Cormack, Findlay Kendrick, Centa Logan, Kathy Schoner, and Frances Pane Kauffman** arrived in Bryn Athyn, Huntingdon Valley, PA, on September 18, 2019 and were given a two-hour tour of the Cairnwood Estate. It was the home of John Pitcairn, a co-founder of the Pittsburgh Plate Glass Co. who made his fortune in the 1870s investing in coal, oil, and gas. Considered a masterpiece of the Gilded Age, it has decorative elements blending influences from Greek and Roman architecture as well as from the French Renaissance. We had a delicious luncheon in the Garden House that Kathy had supplied. After lunch we were given a two-and-a-half-hour tour of the Bryn Athyn Cathedral, located on the Estate. The stained glass was made on-site in the medieval tradition and was spectacular. We all agreed that this visit was outstanding and several of us vowed to return around the holidays to see the holiday decorations.

In lieu of her spouse Don, who was unable to attend, **Jo Page** led those assembled in the Pledge of Allegiance. Mr. Page is a nonagenarian survivor of The Battle of the Bulge. Fonthill President **Donna Zebley** then introduced State President **Ken Keiser**, Area Representative and President of Bess Bardens Society **Karen Goeckler**, and three past Pennsylvania presidents. **Karen Goeckler** delivered the invocation.

The program, that was chosen to commemorate the 75th Anniversary of D-Day, was presented by Melissa Jay. Ms. Jay is Collections Assistant in Research and Library Services for Mercer Museum and Fonthill Castle. Her PowerPoint, which was entitled "On the Homefront and Overseas: American Women during WWII," highlighted specific women from PA and Bucks County.

Amid background music of the forties, members mingled and viewed items related to areas of home life in the forties during the social hour. In order to emphasize the patriotic theme, members of the Fonthill chapter dressed as Rosie the Riveter. Guests were encouraged to wear or accessorize with red, white, or blue. Six display tables inside the ballroom held related memorabilia contributed by members. Artifacts included uniforms, photographs, newspapers, ration books, a song book, and a collection of military buttons. Centerpieces that featured red, white, and blue flowers, ribbons, and an American flag decorated the banquet tables.

Chairperson **Judy Volpe** and her committee designed the luncheon to be interactive. A series of three conversation starters about the war were posted at each table to encourage discussion between the courses. Favors included a beribboned packet of sample candy that was popular during those years. In addition, a brochure depicting fashions from that era included a summary of cost of living items from 1940-1945. Mrs. Volpe concluded the program by thanking everyone, who attended, for commemorating and celebrating The Greatest Generation.

What was the longest, continually-operating iron and steel site in the U.S.? An excursion to the National Iron and Steel Museum and Historic Houses in Coatesville, PA, proved to be a sterling trip for Conestoga Questers. The Lukens Steel Company takes the honor of not only quality but longevity as well. Our tour began at the 1916 Georgian-style main office and executive center followed by a visit to historic family homes, the Steelworker's Memorial, a giant sonarsphere, and the World Trade Center steel trident (which represents the steel that was used to build the first nine outer floors of the Twin Towers by Lukens). Our guide provided a fact-filled introduction to the people, process and product of this Coatesville steel site, known for producing steel for ships, submarines, and buildings. In January Pennypack Questers #1386 enjoyed a visit to Phil Haile's spectacular O gauge Lionel Railroad layout at his home in Warrington. As we opened the doors to the 1500-square-foot

garage which housed the layout, we were greeted with walls decorated with Septa signs, train cars and a caboose lamp. A train scene $5-\frac{1}{2}$ feet high encompassing the entire building lay in front of us. A path around the perimeter gave all a chance to see the buildings, many a tribute to local establishments. The Phillies Stadium added in 2008 when the team won the world series, a Hagey Bus carrying students and a Budweiser brewery were a few of the highlights. But it is the amusement park with a working roller coaster and a merrygo-round that grabs the attention of both children and adults.

It is necessary to walk around this display several times to see everything that is happening. Usually two or three trains run on the 1/4 mile of track at the same time. Windows below the tracks allow you see what is going on underground. In the center of the layout is Phil controlling the switches for the trains, trolleys, buildings etc.

Phil's love of model railroads began at the age of 5. When he and his wife Carol bought their home, he started with a 4-foot by 8-foot platform in his basement. Over the years, it has grown to the exhibit it is today. But the time has come for the Haile's to downsize and the display in its entirety is now up for sale. Hopefully it will find a new home in our area where people will be able to continue to enjoy it for many years.

The women were interrupted in their greetings to each other by John Adams. As he walked into the room, Mr. Doyle was John Adams, and he brought our first Vice President and second President to life. Doyle starred as John Adams in seven separate runs of the musical 1776. He has spoken at Congress Hall, the National Archives, The Library of Congress, the National Portrait Gallery, schools, and colleges to name a few of his performance venues.

John Adams told the Questers of his defense of the British troops who were tried for their role in the Boston Massacre, the reasons behind the American Revolution, and his friendship and clashes with notables of his time–Benjamin Franklin and Thomas Jefferson, and of his reliance on and abiding love for Abigail Adams.
