#### Conestoga #63

#### Welkinweir - "Where Sky Meets Water" Submitted by Robin Koslo-Stahl

On a beautiful blue-sky day, the Conestoga Questers toured the historic house and arboretum/gardens of Welkinweir, listed on the National Register of Historic Places. Victoria Laubach guided us through parts of the property as we learned that it was once part of the Reading Furnace turned mill in the 1800's and then purchased by the Rodebaughs in 1935 for a weekend retreat and summer home. By 1964 the Rodebaughs created Green Valleys Watershed Association and in 1976 established an Open Space Conservation Easement so the future public could enjoy the grounds. The Estate House was originally a farmhouse in 1750, expanded by the Morris family, and then in 1940 updated, enlarged, and designed by architect, Fridtjof Tobiessen. The Association follows the mission of sustainability with solar panels, the recharging of groundwater and the prevention of stormwater runoff.

We were lucky to have the most perfect day with the Azalea Lane and arboretum in full bloom, overlooking the water below. Welkinweir translates to "where sky meets water," and best describes our inspiring day. # Warrington Historical Society Folly Road Schoolhouse Submitted by Mary Doyle Roth, Chair

The three Legacy Oaks Community Quester Chapters: Brown's Folly #1373, John Craig's Tavern #1390 and Museum Pieces #1413 combined forces again to give the Historical Society a great new front door for our schoolhouse. Brown's Folly and John Craig's Tavern chapters were able to combine their contributions with matching funds from the Pennsylvania Questers Grant Fund. Museum Pieces disbanded and gifted the Society with the balance in their bank account. All the funds were combined to purchase a heavy front door custom-made by local craftsmen to match old pictures of the school. Society members found beautiful antique hardware online and the deadbolt will provide us with security that is needed.

One of the members paid the contractor to trim and install the door and hardware. The door will be painted black, and the storm door will be removed once the painting is finished.

This is the third time these three chapters have supported the Warrington Historical Society. In 2019, they supplied the funds for the Teacher's platform. In 2021, we were able to purchase and restore our Pot Belly Stove and obtain several chalk boards.

Besides these generous gifts, these groups have been big supporters of our June and October Open Houses. There are always lots of Questers stopping by to check our progress and supporting us by purchasing our fund-raising items.

#### Pennypack #1386 The Antique Ice Tool Museum Submitted by Marge Eberz

Remember running after the ice truck as a kid? Many of us remember those days!

On a sunny day in May the Pennypack Questers visited the Antique Ice Tool Museum in West Chester. Our tour began with Peter Stack, owner of the museum, and his daughter Kathy giving us a slide show history of the ice trade from 1800 to 1940. The Stacks informed us that the harvesting of ice was a dangerous business, and ice became the second largest export in the United States during the 1800's.

Peter and Kathy led us into the threestory building that had been a bank barn. We learned that most of the items in the museum had been part of the Stack family's ice business which had stretched over three generations. As we strolled through the first floor, we saw all sizes and shapes of augers, tongs, picks and saws. There was also a sleigh that would have been pulled by horses over the ice. Young boys followed the sleigh and cleared snow off the ice and cleaned up after the horses. An elevator took us to the second floor where we were surrounded with ice boxes representing the many years of ice storage before we had refrigerators. The third floor was filled with ice trucks from businesses who delivered ice to people. Behind the museum is a train car that transported ice from one area to another. Ice stations were located every 400 miles to replenish these cars.

As we left this gem of a museum, we all came away with a wealth of information on an industry about which we knew very little. There is no admission fee. The Stacks ask only for a donation to the local fire department. The museum is open to the public on Saturday mornings, but tours can be arranged by contacting the museum.

#### What's in a Name Shavers Spring #670-50 Years Submitted by Marge Eberz

Shavers Spring is the oldest landmark in Indiana County. It was named after Peter Shaver, a trader who passed through this area in 1744. The importance of this spring was due to the fact that many traders and Indians passed through here and refreshed themselves with the spring's water on their way from Philadelphia to Kittanning.

Indiana University has preserved this historical landmark with a fountain motif within a rectangular wall. The water flow from the original natural spring is reinforced by piped water to provide an attractive memorial.

#### What's In A Name Kit-Han-Ne #408-55 Years Submitted by Marge Eberz

In 1730 there was a Lenape Indian village on the banks of the Alleghany River 40 miles west of Pittsburgh. This village was called Kit-Han-Ne. In 1756 Captain Armstrong and his militia destroyed Kit-Han-Ne in one of the bloodiest battles of the French and Indian War. In 1800 the county was called Armstrong and the county seat was Kittanning. The Questers chose Kit-Han-Ne as their chapter's name since it was the original name of this area. Kit-Han-Ne means "on the great river."

#### Fonthill Chapter #254

**Boathouse Row**

Major hurricanes, flooding, dredging and a Covid Pandemic could not deter the Fonthill Questers from finally enjoying a trip to Boathouse Row in Philadelphia. Though rescheduled many times, our illustrious Program Chairs Ginny Clemens and Karen Young persevered and eventually the trip was finally realized in June. In addition, we owe them our sincere gratitude for all the trips and speakers scheduled and re-scheduled over their reign of the past 4 years. Not even smoke debris from the Halifax Forest Fires could deter this lively group.

Boathouse Row was our last trip of the year and an extremely interesting tour. We arrived at Sedgley and were greeted by Dotty Brown, retired Inquirer reporter, editor, and author of "Boathouse Row, Waves of

Change in the Birthplace of American Rowing". What followed was a most informative sharing of Boathouse history and lore, and the history of rowing on the Schuylkill River.

Sedgley was originally built in 1902 around the Lighthouse as a women's social club. It served as a spot where women could relax and socialize after an afternoon spent exercising along the river and in Fairmount Park. The lighthouse, no longer in operation, once warned barges and steamboats of the shallows of Turtle Rock. In 1821 the Fairmount Dam and Canal were built at the lower end of the Schuylkill, originally with the purpose of providing a much-needed water source for Philadelphia. Cast iron piping pumped water to the reservoir where the Art Museum is today. However, the dam also had an added benefit as it transferred the river from a series of falls and tidal currents to a calm lake-like setting perfect for rowing.

What followed after Sedgley was fourteen more boathouses, with the Philadelphia Girls' Rowing Club as #14, built in 1938 remaining as the only women's boathouse on the row. Frank Furness, famed Philadelphia Architect, designed the Undine Barge Club's house in 1882. Pennsylvania Athletic Club, #12, claimed John B. Kelly Sr. as one of its original members. In the 1960's the club added women to their membership and enlarged the building to include women's locker space with additional housing for boat bays. #11 houses the College Boat Club of the University of Pennsylvania built in 1872, which serves both Penn's women and men's crew. #10 is the Vesper Boathouse, the first to permit women members; and as such, it has enjoyed many an athletic prowess with #6 Vesper Women's rowing for the US team in the 1976 Montreal Olympics. Malta #9 is still all men. #8 and #7 housing the University Barge Club, with Bachelor's Barge Club as #6, and Crescent Boat Club #5 are home to various high school and college rowing programs. The Pennsylvania Barge Club, #4, houses the Schuylkill Navy, US Rowing, the Dad Vail Regatta, and other rowing organizations. The Pennsylvania Barge Club claims Max Schmitt as one of its rowers, featured in Thomas Eakins, "The Champion Single Sculls" painting. Fairmount Rowing Association,

#2 and #3 started as largely a blue-collar men's rowing club. Today, it houses not only the Quaker City Masters Regatta for rowers aged 21 and older but also local college and high school rowing programs.

The Lloyd Hall rounds out the row of houses as #1 and features public athletic facilities, a public launching area and the Cosmic Café where we enjoyed a healthy and tasty lunch and meeting. So many of us have only viewed the Boathouses from the Schuylkill Expressway and it was amazing to see the front of these beautiful buildings along Kelly Drive. We highly recommend taking the stroll. Enjoy the View!

Pilgrim #237 ended its 56<sup>th</sup> year of meetings with a visit to Graeme Park and the William Keith House, the home of the provincial Governor of Pennsylvania under the Penn Family. The construction of the house began around 1722 and was renovated by a later occupant, Dr. Graeme. We and our guide had a surprise visit during our tour by a small squirrel hiding under a bed!

We started the year with an introduction to the James Memorial Park buildings including an outstanding German style barn in Sellersville. In October we toured the Joseph Ambler Inn and its outer building in North Wales. Our holiday meeting took place at a member's home. We learned about various traditional ornaments through a Power Point and samples from her collection. The presentation was followed by a holiday lunch.

Our combined January/February meeting is traditionally held in an historic Inn. This year we visited Valley Green Inn, one of the old carriage stops along the Wissahickon Creek. Our hostess had grown up in the area and recounted several adventures on the banks of the creek, including ones in winter snows. March brought a visit to the Historical Society of Montgomery County. Barry Rauhauser, Executive Director, gave us a tour of the building and its



exhibits plus a presentation on "The Culture of Stuff". The Historical Society was the recipient of a \$1200 grant from Pilgrim for restoration of a monument in the Historical Montgomery County Cemetery.

In April, we had a lovely day with a tour of the gardens of Stoneleigh, the home of the Haas family, and a visit to the house with its impressive organ. We were able to tour the pipe rooms in the lower level of the house to get a glimpse of how a pipe organ functions. The 2023-24 year promises many more such adventures.

## **Brittany Belles Questers #405 Mennonite Heritage Center**

The Brittany Belles Questers #405 visited the Mennonite Heritage Center in Harleysville in May. The Center tells the story of Mennonite faith and life, local history, fraktur and changing exhibits. Begun in 1525 in Switzerland, the 'Anabaptist' fellowship moved to Germantown, PA, in 1683 to form the oldest continuing Mennonite community in the world. The Mennonite Heritage Center's mission is to educate, inspire and witness to the church and community by collecting, preserving, and sharing the Anabaptist/ Mennonite story.

The Brittany Belles Questers was chartered at Brittany Pointe Estates 21 years ago. The Questers is a nonprofit organization started in 1944 when Jesse Elizabeth Bardens passed an antique store located in Ambler, PA. She bought an antique syrup pitcher and started a discussion group. From this group, other local clubs or chap-



ters were formed that became known as "Questers'. There are now chapters in forty-one states including Canada. Our local chapter has thirty-six members (limited to 40), meets for 10 months of the year, and pays dues to fund our chapter for tours and speakers. Additionally, we help fund the preservation and restoration of historic buildings and artifacts for educational purposes at the national level. Questers also sponsors two scholarships for graduate school students at The Columbia University Graduate School of Architecture and the University of Delaware/Winterthur. The Quester motto is "It's fun to search and joy to find."
